The Annual Report to the Nation on the Status of Cancer (1975-2012) shows that death rates continued to decline for all cancers combined, as well as for most cancer sites for men and women of all major racial and ethnic populations.

The Report to the Nation is released each year in a collaborative effort by the American Cancer Society, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the National Cancer Institute, and the North American Association of Central Cancer Registries.

Successes from the implementation grantees include the completion of the CRC implementation grantee outcomes report (see page three), culturally specific advance directive educational sessions for elders on the Pine Ridge Reservation, and marked decreases in adolescents with zero doses of HPV vaccine administered and increases in three-dose series completion rates for HPV vaccination as part of Sanford's HPV Vaccination Implementation Grant. Cancer Programs Director Update

South Dakota had the highest incidence of female breast cancer in the nation in 2012. In the U.S. there were 224,147 women diagnosed in 2012 with 672 of those cases from residents of South Dakota. This resulted in a 2012 female breast cancer incidence rate of 141.4 per 100,000 in South Dakota, while the U.S. rate was 122.2. Although South Dakota's incidence of newly diagnosed breast cancers was highest in the nation, the mortality rate ranked 39th. What the task forces are up to...

Priority 6: Increase HPV vaccination rates. *Chaired by [Stacie Fredenburg](#)*

The task force is planning the Adolescent Vaccination Roundtable: A Focus on HPV Vaccination - see page four for more details. The group is also supporting Sanford in the implementation of their HPV Implementation Project and coordinating the HPV Vaccination Webinar Series.

Priority 7: Increase risk-appropriate screening for breast cancer. *Chaired by [Mary Kolsrud](#)*

The task force is working to develop a short video and one-page handout for health care professionals that promote professional guidelines and availability of funding for breast and cervical cancer screening among low-income women. In partnership with the SD Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program, the SD CCCP also released an RFA targeting health systems interested in focusing on increasing breast and cervical cancer screening through evidence-based intervention implementation and policy and system changes. The review committee awarded grants to Horizon Health Care, Inc. and Platte Medical Clinic on June 1st.

Priority 9: Increase risk-appropriate screening for colorectal cancer. *Chaired by [Jill Ireland](#)*

The colorectal task force is coordinating the implementation of the 80% by 2018 Forum action plan and serving as a convener of interested stakeholders and distributor of best practices.

Priority 12: Increase participation in cancer clinical trials. *Co-Chaired by [Charlene Berke](#) and [Lora Black](#)*

The task force is working to complete the clinical trials partnership project with USD that was awarded to the treatment workgroup. The videos are currently under review by the task force. The task force will lead the dissemination efforts for these resources.

Priority 14: Improve availability of palliative and end-of-life care services. *Chaired by [Lexi Haux](#)*

The palliative care task force is working to promote interprofessional palliative care education within SD cancer treatment centers. The group is looking to offer education about integrating palliative care into comprehensive cancer care and is reviewing potential speakers.


Spotlight On...Colorectal Cancer Screening Implementation Grantees

In July 2014, the South Dakota Comprehensive Cancer Control Program (SD CCCP) in partnership with the GetScreenedSD program released a funding opportunity aimed at improving colorectal cancer (CRC) screening rates in South Dakota. The funding was targeted to health care facilities to provide patient education on screening options for CRC and to implement at least one evidence-based system or policy-level change targeting either patients or health care providers.

All of the grantee sites implemented evidenced-based strategies toward increasing screening rates. The funding has made a measureable short-term impact. Colorectal cancer screening rates have improved across the three health systems reporting to national systems. Nearly 9,000 patient reminders were sent out from the three systems.

Yet, most important, are the notable system-level changes that have taken place due to the funding. One site developed EHR reporting capabilities, eliminating a time-intensive and imprecise chart audit that was used for reporting purposes before the funding. All systems established or enhanced work flow processes and patient reminder procedures within an EHR.
